

Indiana Water System Classifications

Community Water System

A public water system which serves at least fifteen (15) service connections used by year-round residents or regularly serves at least twenty-five (25) year-round residents

or

Noncommunity Water System

A public water system which has at least fifteen (15) service connections used by nonresidents or regularly serves at least twenty-five (25) or more nonresident individuals daily for at least sixty (60) days per year

and (circle one)

A Nontransient Noncommunity Water System

A public water system that is not a community water system, which regularly serves the same twenty-five (25) or more persons at least six (6) months per year

B Transient Noncommunity Water System

A public water system that is not a community water system that does not regularly serve at least twenty-five (25) of the same persons over six (6) months per year

Examples of different water systems

Community System	Nontransient Noncommunity System	Transient Noncommunity System
Includes municipal water supplies, subdivisions providing their own water and mobile home parks	Systems include such locations as schools, daycare centers and factories	Systems can be churches, restaurants, grocery stores, and campgrounds that have water accessible to the public
